They will observe the events of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday, and create an Easter Triduum presentation to share with classmates.

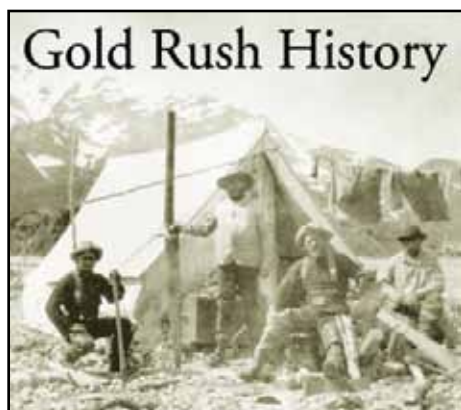

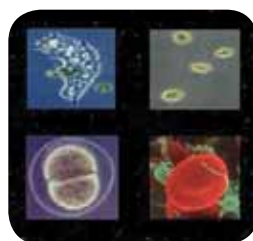

## Easter Symbols ~ Web & Video Resources



Being one of the most important Catholic celebrations in the Church year, Easter is associated with a host of traditional symbols and icons. Most of the Easter symbols pre-date Christianity and are remnants of ancient Pagan symbolism. Each of them though is now

related to the Crucifixion and Resurrection of Our Lord Jesus Christ. Since the Easter celebration heralds the advent of Spring, the symbols connected to it stand for fertility, purity and peace. For instance, Easter symbols such as the bunny and eggs represent the fertile state of mother earth. White lily flowers, which are used to decorate the altar of churches on Easter, represent peace and sanctity. Explore the following websites to learn all about the popular symbols of Easter.

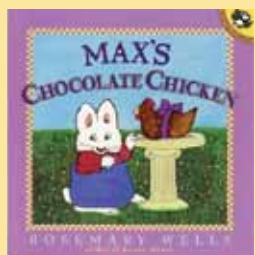
